1. DATA POINTS


We continue to see a substantial increase in the area of clients served. Below are comparisons for our activities.

We continue to trend with a considerable increase in usage Year-Over-Year, (YOY),. We have now surpassed our 2018 yearly totals in all measurable areas including Households with Children, Unique Households Served and Percentage of Households with Children




Below is an update of our Halton Region Statistics. We can now see comparisons of Milton, Georgetown and Oakville to our demographics.

As can be seen in the graph below, though there is some significant increase in the demographic of unique seniors at the Food Bank from 51 to 86 since 2016, there is a more noticeable increase in the demographic of unique children served from 468 to 634 since 2016. I believe in 2020 as part of our objectives; we need to make our assistance for families with children a priority, as children make up 43% of our clients served.

2. MATTERS FOR NOTING

a) Feed Ontario has released their 2019 Hunger Report, we continue trend significantly higher in the percentage of children (43.6%) served in comparison with the provincial percentage (33%). Also noted the increase in the number of employed individuals and families that now need to use Food Banks. Affordable housing continues to be a major issue affecting clients.
